PROJECT DESCRIPTION:	A Mendocino Historical Review Board Permit request to replace existing windows with wooden windows, install a water heater and copper roof vent, install gable end vents, and paint the house and accessory structure "Queen Anne Pink," "Newburyport Blue," and white colors. Note: The site is listed in the Mendocino Town Plan Appendix Inventory of Historic Structures as a Category IIa historic resource.

APPLICABLE SECTIONS OF MHRB GUIDELINES: Reconstructions (Page 9), Demolition (page 10).

VI.3. <u>SITE DEVELOPMENT GUIDELINES</u> reads: "The orientation, setback alignment, space and placement of a building on site will be considered with special consideration given to the retention of natural topography and vegetation. All structural landscape elements and fences will be considered.

**STAFF NOTES:** The applicant proposed a variety of improvements to the dwelling and accessory structure. No alterations to the existing garage are proposed.

- 1. Paint the house and accessory structures "Queen Anne Pink," "Newburyport Blue," and white colors.
- Replace, repair, and install new wooden windows and window trim, form and colors to be similar to existing fenestration. One new window installed on the south elevation of the accessory structure (studio). One new window installed on the north elevation of the dwelling and replace windows on the west and south elevation of the dwelling.
- 3. Relocate existing satellite dish.
- 4. Install new wooden end vents below the dwelling's gables. Add foundation vents to accessory structure (studio).
- 5. Conceal water heater and add a copper hood vent (north elevation of dwelling). Remove plastic hood vent.

See application project description questionnaire and plans submitted for additional details.

**REQUIRED FINDINGS:** The Review Board shall not approve or conditionally approve any application for proposed work unless it affirmatively makes the following findings:

- 1. The exterior appearance and design of the proposed work is in harmony with the exterior appearance and design of the existing structures within the District and with that of existing subject structure, if any; and
- 2. The appearance of the proposed work will not detract from the appearance of other property within the District; and
- 3. Where the proposed work consists of alteration or demolition of an existing structure, that such work will not unnecessarily damage or destroy a structure of historical, architectural or cultural significance.

#### CONDITIONS:

- 1. This action shall become final and effective on the 11<sup>th</sup> day following the decision unless an appeal is filed pursuant to Section 20.760.072 of the Mendocino County Code. The permit shall expire and become null and void at the expiration of two years after the effective date except where construction and or use of the property in reliance on such permit has been completed prior to its expiration.
- 2. The application along with supplemental exhibits and related material shall be considered elements of this permit, and compliance therewith is mandatory.
- This permit shall be subject to the securing of all necessary permits for the proposed development from County, State and Federal agencies having jurisdiction. The applicant shall secure all required building permits for the proposed project as required by the Building Inspection Division.
- 4. This permit shall be subject to revocation or modification upon a finding of any one (1) or more of the following:
  - a. That such permit was obtained or extended by fraud.
  - b. That one or more of the conditions upon which such permit was granted have been violated.

- c. A final judgment of a court of competent jurisdiction has declared one (1) or more conditions to be void or ineffective, or has enjoined or otherwise prohibited the enforcement or operation of one (1) or more such conditions.
- 5. To establish that site-work satisfies the requirements of MHRB Permit 2017-0007 and the Review Board's action, the property owner shall request a Planning and Building Services Final Inspection prior to the expiration of this permit. Prior to this MHRB Permit's expiration (if no Building Permit is obtained) and at the request of the property owner, PBS will furnish, following a site inspection of completed work, a functionally equivalent document demonstrating that the requirements of MHRB Permit 2017-0007 have been satisfied.
- 6. Any Building Permit request shall include MHRB Permit #2017-0007 (attached to or printed on the plans submitted).

The Review Board's action and this permit will not be final and effective and work may not commence on the project until after a ten day appeal period has ended. You will be notified if a timely appeal is filed.

Appeal Fee: \$1,616.00 (Check payable to County of Mendocino).

Appeal Period: Appeals must be received within 10 days of Review Board Action.

Studio Outbuilding:

- 1. Install new 3'-0"x4'-0" double hung wood window (similar to existing window in east elevation) in south elevation.
- 2. Repaint per #5 above.

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

Background history:

4/13/1885, Capt Lansing to Moses Greenwood, Deeds, Bk 35, pg 277, beginning corner of Pine & Howard Sts, east to School Street on north side of Pine Street, 73' on School and 72.5' on Howard Street.

Beacon, 5/27/1885, Moses Greenwood has put up the frame of a new building on Howard St. #12.

Beacon, 8/22/1885, J. J. Morrow and family have moved into one of the new residences recently erected by Moses Greenwood (#12 or #13).

3/27/1886, Moses Greenwood has erected two more cottages on his propertyon Pine Street. #14 & #15.

Beacon, 4/19/1924, Mr. Heeser recalls these cottages were built for Greenwood by William Riley Hamilton, local building contractor.

7/1/1893, Dave Kearns purchased all four of Moses Greenwood's cottages on Pine Street. Consideration \$2,000.00. 9/1/1894, Dave Kearns moved into cottage on Parcel #14.

6/3/1922, Dave Kearns offered three of the four cottages for sale.

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#### #12 -

4/19/1924, Mrs. Elizabeth Clark of Little River this week purchased the cottage on the corner of Pine & Howard Streets.

5/16/1936, Clark cottage purchased by Felix W. Lyons of Fort Bragg. This cottage was subsequently sold to Wm. & Florence Mendosa, and is currently (1999) owned by Jeanette (Mendosa) Hansen, and is currently offered for sale. (See MHRB Agenda, Oct. 3, 1994, for application by Jeanette Hansen for various improvements.)

#### #13

9/4/1923, Arthur Pritchard purchased cottage #13 from Dave Kearns. 6/11/1926, Pritchard sold this cottage toMrs. Jessie B. Matheson. McClintock, lumber company engineer owned this cottage for a time, and in May, 1945, he sold it to Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Story. William Mendosa bought it from Mrs. Story and it is currently owned by his daughter, Mrs. Jeanette Hansen.

#### #14

Dave Kearns continued to occupy this cottage until his demise in 4/28/1927 at age 83. Widow Angie Kearns continued to occupy #14. 12/23/1963, Angie Kearns to Angie Kearns Smothers. Joan Curry is currently owner of this cottage and occupies it.

#### #15

Reference Beacon legal notice, 6/2/1960, re sale of Jasperson House by Helen Huff, describes this cottage as "now or lately owned by Leslie Amundsen"...

4/19/1941, Mr. and Mrs. Everett Helala have moved into the house recently vacated by Mr. and Mrs. Leslie Amundsen.

"Im sure Grace Helala told me she paid rent to Dave Kearns." Beacon, 1/28/1966, Leslie Kershner, lived here 19 years, in a residence opposite the elementary school. Mr. Kershner died at age 91, 1/16.1966. At some point, Gus & AlmaMendosa acquired this cottage and maintained it as a long term rental for many years. Both deceased, it has been a part of Alma Mendosa estate, and sold by her heirs to Joan Curry, who maintains it as a long term rental.

Mrs. Curry notes this cottage was sold to Clarence Mathews in 1924, with the proviso that well water had to be made available to other cottages when wells on their lots were low or went dry. L Joan Curry and Jeanette Hansen have signed off to remove this proviso from the deed to 119-150-15.

Little it known of Moses Greenwood. He also owned a property at Elk. Beacon, 9/23/1899, Moses Greenwood an old and well known coaster, died at the County Hospital last week at age 65 years. (I was unable to turn up any record). HAVE NOT BEEN SURVEYED


8/ 22/1885, Mr. J. J. Morrow & family have moved into one of the new residences on Howard St. recently erected by Moses Greenwood.

### DAVE KEARNS SELLS COTTAGE

David Kearns, pioneer resident of this place, has disposed of the third of the four cottages owned by him on Pine street adjacent to the public school grounds. Mrs. Elizabeth Clark of Little River this week purchasing the cottage on the corner of Pine and Howard streets. This leaves Mr. Kearns with but one cottage where he makes his home.

These four dwellings, if we remember, rightly were built by Riley Hamilton, an early-day carpenter of this place, for the late Mose Greenwood. Mr. Kearns bought Greenwood out some thirty years ago and has owned the property ever since, looking after their care and up-keep himself and renting them until about a year ago when he concluded to dispose of them because of his advancing years.



"Please support continuation of the Outer Continental Shelf coastal protections recommended by the administration as part of the Fiscal Year 1994 Interior Appropriations Bill, with the addition of a one-year deferral of drilling in the Florida Panhandle and on North Carolina's Outer Banks, and with a one-year deferral of new OCS leasing in the rich fishing grounds of Alaska's \ Shelikoff Strait, combined with a one-year hold on planning steps for other lease sales in Alaskan waters until the adequacy of environmental information can be assured."



### DAVE KEARNS, COAST RESIDENT FOR FIFTY YEARS, DIES

Dave Kearns, for over fifty years a resident of this coast, died at his home here. Thursday morning, after but a few days confinement to his bed. However, he had been in feeble health for several years and for some months past his condition had been most serious. Mrs. Kearns has been an invalid for a number of years by reason of a fall and injury to her hip and also to the infirmities of old age, and Mr. Kearns devoted himself to her care and was almost constantly with her and the passing of her life partner and devoted companion is a great loss to her.

Dave Kearns has been a well-known figure in this town for over forty years. A native of Hemmingsford, Province of Quebec, Canada, Mr. Kearns left home at an early age and came to this coast some 53 years ago. He found employment in the logging woods but later took up ranch work, having been raised on a farm, and being skilled in farm work. For many years he had charge of the company's dairy and ranch operations here, and after giving up this position held similar p sitions on other local farms, giving general satisfaction in the discharge of his duties.

Mr. Kearns was a man of very staunch principles, upright and honest in all his dealings, a true and good friend, and very highly regarded by all who knew him. He was a man of quiet speech and even disposition and a great lover of children and delighted in entertaining them with stories. These little friendcame regularly the last days of his illness to inquire for him hoping and trusting that he might recover.




