# **BACKGROUND**

**PROJECT DESCRIPTION:** Minor Subdivision of a 7.3± acre parcel creating three (3) parcels, ranging in size from 1.31± to 3.09± acres.

**RELATED APPLICATIONS ON-SITE:** Minor Subdivision # MS 8-83 resulted in the creation of the subject parcel.

SITE CHARACTERISTICS: The project site is located 2± miles southwest of Redwood Valley town center, and is 7.3± acres in size. The parcel is less than a mile south from US Highway 101 entrances, and lies adjacent to Uva Drive (CR 239). There is a 40 ft. wide driveway in the western corner of the property that is intended to serve each dwelling unit. Presently, there are two (2) existing 2,000± sq. ft. single-family residences and one 725± sq. ft. garage. There are two (2) leachfields, two (2) Redwood Valley County Water District connections, and one (1) well. Electricity, gas, and telephone connections are provided through utility companies.

Upon subdivision, "Parcel 1" will be 1.31± acres in size and remain undeveloped; "Parcel 2" will be 2.90± acres and retain one (1) of the existing residences, one (1) leachfield, and one (1) water connection; and "Parcel 3" will be 3.09± acres and retain the other residence, garage, well, and water connection.

**SURROUNDING LAND USE AND ZONING:** As listed on Table 1, the surrounding lands are primarily zoned Rural Residential. The subject property is situated along a publicly maintained local road (Uva Drive – CR 239). The adjacent lots to the east and west appear developed with single-family residential dwelling units and accessory structures, while the lots across Uva Drive are a mixture of RR-2 & RR-5 zoning designations. Forsythe Creek runs along the northern property boundary and separates the subject property from vacant land that is zoned RR-1.

#### **KEY ISSUES**

**1. General Plan and Zoning Consistency:** The project is consistent with the General Plan designation for Rural Residential. All three of the proposed parcels will maintain the 40,000 square foot minimum lot area requirement. The Land Use Section of the General Plan states the following as the intent of the Rural Residential Land Use Category, Policy DE-14:

The RR classification is intended to encourage local small scale food production (farming) in areas which are not well suited for large scale commercial agriculture, defined by present or potential use, location, mini-climate, slope, exposure, etc. The Rural Residential classification is not intended to be a growth area, and residences should be located as to create minimal impact on agricultural viability.

The subject property generally complies with the Rural Residential (RR:1) land use category. Given the size of the lot and soils, it will be developed as intended by the General Plan.

The Zoning classification of the proposed project is Rural Residential, which is compatible with its General Plan land use designation by the General Plan. The Zoning Ordinance states the following as intent of the Rural Residential District (Mendocino County Code Section 20.048.005):

This district is intended to create and enhance residential areas where agricultural use compatible with a permanent residential use is desired. Typically the "R-R" District would be applied to rural or semi-rural areas where urban levels of service are not available and where large lots are desired.

The proposed project is consistent with the Rural Residential (RR-1) zoning district classification, per intended uses and minimum parcels sizes.

- **2. Division of Land Regulations:** The project was reviewed by the County Subdivision Committee on July 11, 2019, at which time the Subdivision Committee recommended conditional approval of the proposed minor subdivision to the Planning Commission per the required finding found in Mendocino County Code Section 17-48.5. No conflicts with the County Division of Land Regulations were identified.
- **3. Environmental Protection:** An Initial Study for the proposed project was completed in accordance with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). Staff has found that the project will have a less than significant impact on the environment, without mitigation. Therefore, a Negative Declaration is recommended.

### **RECOMMENDATION**

By resolution, the Planning Commission adopt a Negative Declaration and grant MS\_2018-0006 for the Project, as proposed by the applicant, based on the facts and findings and subject to the Conditions of Approval.

WHEREAS, the Planning Commission has had an opportunity to review this Resolution and finds that it accurately sets for the intentions of the Planning Commission regarding the Negative Declaration and the Project.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Planning Commission makes the following findings;

- 1. General Plan Findings: The subject property is designated Rural Residential (RR:1) under the General Plan, and the Project is consistent with the General Plan per Policy DE-14.
- 2. Zoning Findings: The subject property is classified Rural Residential (RR-1). The Project is consistent with the County Zoning per Mendocino County Code §20.048.
- 3. Environmental Findings: A CEQA Initial Study was completed by staff, which determined the Project to have a less than significant to no impact on the environment, and any concerns are adequately addressed through the conditions of approval so that no adverse environmental impacts will result from the Project; therefore a Negative Declaration is adopted.
- 4. Division of Land Regulations: The Planning Commission finds the Project to be consistent with Chapter 17 of the Mendocino County Code, Division of Land Regulations.

# CONDITIONS OF APPROVAL MS 2018-0006 – DONALD J & SHELLI I CORNS

#### **SEPTEMBER 19, 2019**

<u>APPROVED PROJECT DESCRIPTION:</u> Minor Subdivision of a 7.3± acre parcel creating three (3) parcels, ranging in size from 1.31± to 3.09± acres.

#### **CONDITIONS OF APPROVAL:**

ALL CONDITIONS OF APPROVAL MUST BE MET PRIOR TO EXPIRATION OF TWENTY-FOUR (24) MONTHS FROM DATE OF APPROVAL, UNLESS RENEWED PURSUANT TO THE MENDOCINO COUNTY CODE.

#### Aesthetics:

 A notation shall appear on the Parcel Map stating all future external lighting, whether installed for security, safety or landscape design purposes, shall be shielded, downcast or shall be positioned in a manner that will not shine or allow light glare to exceed the boundaries of the parcel on which it is placed.

# Air Quality:

- 2. A notation shall appear on the Parcel Map stating that "future development of building site(s), access roads or driveways may be subject to the grading requirements and drainage control measures identified in the Conditions of Approval."
- 3. A notation shall appear on the Parcel Map stating that "the access road, driveway and interior circulation routes be maintained in such a manner as to insure minimum dust generation subject to Air Quality Management District Regulation 1 Rule 430. All grading must comply with Air Quality Management District Regulations Rule 430. Any rock material, including natural rock from the property, used for surfacing must comply with Air Quality Management District regulations regarding asbestos content."

#### Biological Resources:

4. This entitlement does not become effective or operative and no work shall be commenced under this entitlement until the California Department of Fish and Wildlife filing fees required or authorized by Section 711.4 of the Fish and Game Code are submitted to the Mendocino County Department of Planning and Building Services. Said fee of \$2,404.75 (effective January 1, 2019) shall be made payable to the Mendocino County Clerk and submitted to the Department of Planning and Building Services prior to September 30, 2019 at 5:00 p.m. Any waiver of the fee shall be on a form issued by the Department of Fish and Wildlife upon their finding that the project has "no effect" on the environment. If the project is appealed, the payment will be held by the Department of Planning and Building Services until the appeal is decided. Depending on the outcome of the appeal, the payment will either be filed with the County Clerk (if the project is approved) or returned to the payer (if the project is denied). Failure to pay this fee by the specified deadline shall result in the entitlement becoming null and void. The applicant has the sole responsibility to insure timely compliance with this condition.

# **Cultural Resources:**

5. A notation shall appear on the Parcel Map stating that in the event that archaeological resources (cultural resources and/or human remains) are encountered during the development of the property, work in the immediate vicinity of the find shall be halted until all requirements of Chapter 22.12 of the Mendocino County Code relating to archaeological discoveries have been satisfied.

#### Geology & Soils:

- 6. The sub-divider shall **acknowledge in writing** to the Department of Planning and Buildings Services that all grading activities and site preparation, at a minimum, shall adhere to the following "Best Management Practices". The applicant shall submit to the Department of Planning and Building Services an acknowledgement of these grading and site preparation standards:
  - a. That adequate drainage controls be constructed and maintained in such a manner as to prevent contamination of surface and/or ground water, and to prevent erosion.
  - b. The applicant shall endeavor to protect and maintain as much vegetation on the site as possible, removing only as much as required to conduct the operation.
  - c. All concentrated water flows, shall be discharged into a functioning storm drain system or into a natural drainage area well away from the top of banks.
  - d. Temporary erosion and sediment control measures shall be established and maintained until permanent protection is established.
  - e. Erosion control measures shall include, but are not limited to, seeding and mulching exposed soil on hill slopes, strategic placement of hay bales below areas subject to sheet and rill erosion, and installation of bioengineering materials where necessary. Erosion control measures shall be in place prior to October 1<sup>st</sup>.
  - f. All earth moving activities shall be conducted between May 15<sup>th</sup> and October 15<sup>th</sup> of any given calendar year unless wet weather grading protocols are approved by the Department of Planning and Building Services or other agencies having jurisdiction.
  - g. Pursuant to the California Building Code and Mendocino County Building Regulations a grading permit will be required unless exempted by the Building Official or exempt by one of the following:
    - i. An excavation that (1) is less than 2 feet (610 mm) in depth or (2) does not create a cut slope greater than 5 feet (1524 mm) in height and steeper than 1 unit vertical in 1½ units horizontal (66.7% slope).
    - ii. A fill less than 1 foot (305 mm) in depth and placed on natural terrain with a slope flatter than 1 unit vertical in 5 units horizontal (20% slope), or less than 3 feet (914 mm) in depth, not intended to support structures, that does not exceed 50 cubic yards (38.3 m³) on any one lot and does not obstruct a drainage.

#### Hazards & Hazardous Materials:

7. All areas within the subdivision subject to flooding shall be clearly identified on the Parcel Map. The information on the parcel map shall be based on a flood hazards report prepared by a Civil Engineer and filed with the Planning and Building Services Department and the Mendocino County Department of Transportation. The flood hazards report, using data developed by the Federal Emergency Management Agency, shall clearly identify the magnitude of the flood potential as such relates to the subdivision. A reference to the report shall be made on the parcel map.

The area of the subdivision within the "floodway" as defined by the Federal Emergency Management Agency and on file with the Mendocino County Planning and Building Services Department shall be delineated easement on the Parcel Map.

A note shall appear on the Parcel Map stating that "Development within the flood plain as identified on this map is subject to those restrictions in the Flood Plain regulations of the Mendocino County Code."

8. A notation shall appear on the Parcel Map stating that "No toxic, hazardous or contaminated materials or waste shall be stored in a designated buffer area or clearly identified flood plain or floodway."

#### Fire:

- 9. The subdivider shall comply with those recommendations in the CalFire letter of December 14, 2018 (CAL FIRE# 557-18) or other alternatives as acceptable to CalFire. Written verification shall be submitted from CalFire to the Department of Planning and Building Services that this condition has been met to the satisfaction of CalFire.
- 10. The subdivider shall comply with those recommendations from the Redwood Valley Calpella Fire District to prevent or minimize safety hazards from the project. Written verification shall be submitted from the Fire District to the Department of Planning and Building Services that this condition has been met to the satisfaction of the Fire District.

#### Hydrology & Water Quality:

- 11. The applicant shall provide the Division of Environmental Health adequate advance written notice (minimum of 15 days) of the date and time any field soil testing procedures for any proposed on-site sewage systems to allow the Division of Environmental Health staff to be present for soil testing.
- 12. The applicant shall submit to the Division of Environmental Health an acceptable site evaluation report (DEH FORM #42.04) for parcel 1; completed by a qualified individual demonstrating compliance with the North Coast Regional Water Quality Control Board's Basin Plan Policy for Onsite Waste Treatment and Disposal and Mendocino County Division of Environmental Health's Requirements (DEH FORM # 26.09).
- 13. The applicant shall submit to the Division of Environmental Health an acceptable site evaluation report (DEH FORM #42.04) for a <u>replacement system for the existing structures</u> located on parcels 2 and 3, completed by a qualified individual, demonstrating compliance with the North Coast Regional Water Quality Control Board's Basin Plan Policy for On-site Waste Treatment and Disposal and Mendocino County Division of Environmental Health's Requirements (DEH FORM # 26.09).
- 14. The applicant shall submit to the Division of Environmental Health an acceptable site development plan at a scale of not more than 1 inch = 50 feet showing all adjacent parcels on one sheet completed by a qualified individual showing the location and dimensions of the initial sewage disposal system(s), 100% replacement area(s), acceptable setback distances to water wells and other pertinent setback distances which may impact project site development.
- 15. The applicant shall submit to the Division of Environmental Health acceptable water quantity evaluation of 1,200 gallon Proof of Water Test (DEH FORM #26.05). The evaluation must be completed by a qualified individual of a water source located on parcel 3 of the subdivision demonstrating an adequate water supply in compliance with the Division of Environmental Health's Requirements (DEH FORM #26.09).
- 16. The applicant shall submit to the Division of Environmental Health an acceptable standard mineral analysis performed by a certified public health laboratory from an identified source on the subdivision. Compounds to be tested for, at a minimum are: Calcium, Iron (total), Magnesium, Manganese (total),

Potassium, Sodium, Bicarbonate, Carbonate, Corrosivity (pH), Alkalinity (total), Total dissolved solids, Turbidity, Chloride, Fluoride, Nitrate, Sulfate, Calcium hardness, Magnesium hardness and Total hardness.

#### Transportation:

The sub-divider shall comply with the Transportation conditions noted below; or other alternatives as acceptable to the Mendocino County Department of Transportation.

#### 17. EASEMENTS & DEDICATIONS

- a. There shall be provided an access easement of forty (40) feet in width from a publicly maintained road to Parcel 2. Documentation of access easement shall be provided to the Mendocino County Department of Transportation for their review prior to final approval.
- b. If a Parcel Map is filed, all easements of record shall be shown on the parcel map. All public utility lines shall be shown as easements with widths as shown of record or a minimum of ten (10) feet, whichever is greater.
- c. Private roads and public utility easements shall be offered for dedication.
- d. All natural drainage and water courses shall be considered as easements. Minimum width shall be twenty (20) feet, or to the high water level plus five (5) feet horizontal distance, whichever is greater. If a Parcel Map is filed, such easements shall be shown on the final parcel map.

#### 18. ROAD IMPROVEMENT REQUIREMENTS

- a. Subdivision road within the access easement shall be improved in accordance with County of Mendocino Road and Development Standards drawing A10H and the following minimum standards: Twenty Two (22) foot wide, eight (8) inch minimum thickness Class II Aggregate Base rocked road within the access easement. The road improvements shall be constructed with Class II Aggregate Base per CalTrans Standards and Specifications 2018.
- b. A standard private road approach shall be constructed according to Mendocino County Road and Development Standards Drawing A51B from private road onto Uva Drive (CR 239), to be paved with asphalt concrete or comparable surfacing to the adjacent road. Concrete driveways shall not be permitted.
- c. There shall be a 40-foot radius turnaround constructed within a 50-foot radius easement OR 20-foot wide by 60-foot long hammerhead turnaround within a 40-foot wide by 80-foot long easement at the terminus of the access easement to the satisfaction of the Mendocino County Department of Transportation per Mendocino County Road and Development Standards Drawings A16 and A17. This turnaround shall be constructed with Class II Aggregate Base per CalTrans Standards and Specifications 2018.
- d. If approval of the tentative map is conditioned upon certain improvements being made by the subdivider, the subdivider shall notify the Mendocino County Department of Transportation when such improvements have been completed. Prior to the filing of the parcel map, required road improvement must be inspected and approved by the Department of Transportation. Current inspection fees apply.
- e. Any proposed work with County rights-of-way requires obtaining an encroachment permit from the Mendocino County Department of Transportation.

# Additional Conditions:

- 19. All building/development setbacks indicating front/rear/side to all property boundaries (existing and proposed) and roadway/easements shall be designated on the Parcel Map.
- 20. Pursuant to Government Code Section 66492 & 66493, prior to recordation of the Parcel Map, the sub-divider must: (1) Obtain a Certificate from the Mendocino County Tax Collector stating that all current taxes and any delinquent taxes have been paid, and (2) Pay a security deposit (or bond) for taxes that are a lien, but not yet due and payable.

Redwood Valley is a community with a local water agency of name "Redwood Valley County Water District." There is currently a moratorium which impede undeveloped parcels from acquiring a new connection to the Water District grid. The proposed subdivision includes two water meters and one well. The use of the existing well has the preliminary approval from the County's Division of Environmental Health, subject to tests and permitting.

a - m) Less Than Significant Impact: The proposed subdivision itself will not violate any water quality standards or waste discharge requirements. The proposed subdivision itself will not result in any pollutant discharges which would degrade groundwater quality. However, should the parcels be further developed in the future, there is the potential that more intensive uses could result in pollutant discharges and impacts on water quality. Additional housing may be proposed upon subdivision approval, however no development is proposed within the 100 year flood area at this time; a Condition will ensure a note on the parcel map raises awareness of those restrictions in the Flood Plain Regulations of the Mendocino County Code, Furthermore, the proposed subdivision is not within an inundation zone, therefore no floods can occur due to levee or dam failure. There is no evidence that the project would substantially deplete any groundwater supplies. However, there may be effects on such water issues should future development occur, though the potential impact on the site and area is considered less than significant. The Division of Environmental Health provided recommendations during the July 11, 2019 Subdivision Committee meeting, requiring a water test among other conditions; this is reflected in the recommended conditions. While there is potential for future development to occur on the subdivision, there will be no impacts on drainage patterns, particularly those that would result in flooding, because of the topography of the project site. This includes the potential for drainage systems to be impacted by polluted runoff. The northern site boundary is defined by the Forsythe Creek, therefore there is a relatively small riparian habitat portion. The project was referred out to the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) and no response was received. Since no development other than the parcel subdivision is proposed at this time, there are no significant impacts on the riparian habitat. However, a Condition is recommended as stated in Section IV of this report to be in compliance with Department of Fish and Wildlife Code 711.4.

Therefore, after subdivision approval, there is a potential for people to be exposed to increased noise levels and ground borne vibrations during construction; although it is considered to be less than significant. While the subdivision itself would not increase any ambient noise levels, future development of the parcels could increase ambient noise levels, either permanently or temporarily. No excessive noise will result from the project and no mitigation is required.

Redwood Valley County Water District will continue to provide water service to the two existing residential dwelling units, which are identified as "parcel 2" and "parcel 3" on the tentative map. "Parcel 1" will have a well. The entire property is not within a Sanitation District, thus the provision of such service is restricted to on-site septic systems. Two existing leachfield areas are identified on the applicant's tentative map for "parcel 2" and "parcel 3," while a note shows for "parcel 1" stating it "will have a new system designed" and "Preliminary testing has already been done and the site has acceptable soils per Carl Rittiman & Associates." The Division of Environmental Health (DEH) provided comments on May 1, 2019; then reaffirmed and further elaborated on them during the July 11, 2019 Subdivision Committee meeting, providing requirements for septic and water. DEH comments are reflected in the conditions. The proposed subdivision will comply with federal, state, and local regulations regarding solid waste.
