SUMMARY OF REQUEST / BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The Kemper Ad Hoc committee has formed a quorum with the Behavioral Health Advisory Board, NAMI, and Behavioral Health to identify service gaps and suggestions for how that might be addressed through Measure B.

Measure B Program Funding Suggestions

A collaboration of the Behavioral Health Advisory Board, Behavioral Health and Recovery Services, and the Mendocino County National Alliance on Mental Illness are submitting the following recommendations on how Measure B dollars should be spent to support the local mental health system of care.

The collaboration would like to see a focus on prevention and early intervention and aftercare services. We also want to acknowledge the parity issues that exist between Medi-Cal and private insurance, which affects the services available to individuals living in Mendocino County and would like to recommend the Mendocino County Board of Supervisors push for legislative change that creates parity for all individuals needing mental health services.

Housing – Housing is a needed resource within Mendocino County, especially for our vulnerable mental health population. It has been proven that providing housing allows individuals with mental health conditions to improve their lives and succeed with recovery. Housing is the first step in prevention and early intervention. It creates stability that allows people to begin and succeed in recovery. It is really hard for an individual to maintain without stable housing. We propose that Measure B allocate a one-time allocation of One Million Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,300,000) to purchase and renovate or build permanent housing for individuals on the coast that are homeless, chronically homeless, or at risk of chronic homelessness who have a mental health condition.

Community Education, Awareness, and Support (CEAS) — Individuals with mental health conditions experience discrimination and stigma on a daily basis. There is a need in our community to provide education and awareness around mental health conditions to law enforcement, physicians, community leaders, and community members as a whole to reduce discrimination and stigma. Discrimination and stigma impacts an individual's desire to seek services and get the help they need. Families and individuals with mental health conditions also need assistance navigating the community resources and support systems. We recommend that Measure B allocate Three Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$350,000) per year for four (4) years. We also recommend the selected provider apply for grants and seek additional funding opportunities during that four (4) year period to sustain in future years.

Crisis Assessment and Psychiatric Hospitalization Aftercare (Aftercare) – On regular basis individuals are discharged from an acute psychiatric hospital stay or received a crisis (5150) assessment. Individuals that have Medi-Cal or are indigent are offered follow-up services for at least 60-days to get them connected to services. If an individual has private insurance or Medicare there is no guarantee the individual will get the needed follow-up services to be sure they are connected to services. This lack of follow-up services increases the risk for re-

hospitalization. The collaboration recommends that Measure B allocate Two Hundred Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$260,000) per year for 4 years to provide follow-up services to all individual not eligible for county services being discharged from a psychiatric hospital stay or receiving a crisis (5150) assessment. We also recommend that outcome statics are tracked and reported, so that information can be provided on the success of this program and allow for advocacy with private insurance and Medicare to fund these services for their clients.

Mobile Crisis Team – This recommendation proposes a pilot program that would shift from a Mobile Outreach and Prevention Services to a Mobile Crisis Team that would provide three Mental Health Rehabilitation Specialists to respond and ride along with the Mendocino County Sheriff's Office. Data is available that shows these teams can be very effective and supportive for the individual involved in a mental health crisis. The collaboration recommends that Measure B allocate Three Hundred Forty Thousand Dollars (\$340,000) per year for 4 years to fund three Mental Health Rehabilitation Specialist for the Mobile Crisis Team program. We also recommend that outcome statics are tracked and reported, so that information can be provided on the success of this program.

Crisis Residential Treatment Facility (CRTF) — Mendocino County could benefit from having a Crisis Residential Treatment Facility within the county. The collaboration would suggest that the county contract with an operator that will work with other counties, such as Lake and private insurance companies to help with meeting capacity and operating costs. However, we included the potential cost of operating a CRTF in the projections provided to Measure B, if the selected contractor pursued no other means of payment. This collaboration projects the reimbursement for Medi-Cal and County realignment funds to be around \$600,000 with the proposed Measure B dollars of \$500,000; the cost of operations would total \$1,100,000, which is consistent with operation cost reported by other CRTF programs.

Psychiatric Hospital Facility (PHF) – Mendocino County could benefit from having an acute psychiatric facility within the county. The collaboration would suggest that the county contract with an operator that can run a facility independent of additional monies from Measure B beside that cost of building or renovation of the facility. We would also suggest that the selected contractor work with other counties such as Lake, private insurance companies and Medicare to help with meeting capacity and operating cost. This proposal would also require any agency using the facility to place an individual to cover the cost, if not allowable by insurance. If this facility is operated similar to other private facilities, the collaboration believes the facility would be able to operate without Measure B dollars to support operational cost. Therefore, we did not project any Measure B dollars for a PHF.

SUMMARY OF REQUEST / BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

In a collaborative effort, the Auditor's Office, Behavioral Health, Facilities Department, Executive Office, Consultants, and Project Manager have compiled a comprehensive estimate of the costs for current and potential projects as well as operations of intended services therein.

The attached documentation will show active budgets, estimates for facilities and operations costs, business financials (where applicable), and the overall program balance.

Mendocino County

Mental Health Treatment Act Five (5) Year Proceeds Projection

Mendocino County Auditor Controller Lloyd Weer provided a Mental Health Treatment Act five (5) year proceeds projection based off sales and use tax proceeds received to-date for fiscal years 2018 – 2019 and 2019 -2020; and estimated future year proceeds based off fiscal year 2019 -2020 proceeds in combination with the projected economic shortfalls. The COVID-19 pandemic has had a financial impact on revenues and those projected impacts have been considered in preparation of these projections.

The revenue projections have been separated out to align with the ordinance breakdown of a maximum of 75% for facilities, minimum 25% for services and treatment, and 100% after year 5 for ongoing operations, services, and treatment.

Mr. Weer's five (5) year projections include the proceeds projected from sales and use tax, and quarterly interest accrued. The overall cumulative amount for facilities at the end of fiscal year (FY) 2022 -2023 is projected at Twenty-Nine Million Two Hundred Twenty Eight Thousand dollars (\$29,228,000). The overall cumulative amount for operations at the end of FY 2022 – 2023 is projected at Nine Million Seven Hundred Forty Three Thousand dollars (\$9,743,000). These projections take in to account the impacts of COVID-19 on the sales and use tax. There is a projected 17.65% reduction in sales and use taxes in FY 2020 - 2021 from FY 2019 – 2020; for FY 2021 – 2022 it is estimated there will be a 14.7% reduction; and in FY2022 – 2023 an estimated reduction of 11.7%. Mr. Weer projects that we may not see any increases in sales and use tax proceeds until FY 2024-2025 or beyond. Mr. Weer also provided projections for operations proceeds for an additional five (5) years where the sales and use tax drops to one-eighth cent (0.125%). As a reminder, these are projections and may change. See the tables below for more information.

Mendocino County Behavioral Health and Recovery Services

Operational Costs for Proposed Crisis Residential Treatment Facility and Psychiatric Health Facility/Psychiatric Hospital

Mendocino County is committed to improving the lives of residents and the public's safety with enhanced mental health resources through the adoption of an ordinance to:

- A. Provide assistance in the diagnosis, treatment, and recovery from mental illness and addiction by developing: 1) a psychiatric health facility and other behavioral health facilities; and 2) a regional behavioral health training facility to be used by behavioral health professionals, public safety, and other first responders.
- B. Provide for the necessary infrastructure to support and stabilize individuals with behavioral health conditions, including addiction and neurological disorders.


The Mental Health Treatment Act ordinance is a special transaction (sales) and use that tax to create a Mental Health Treatment Fund entirely dedicated to funding improved services, treatment, and facilities for persons with mental health and/or substance use disorder conditions.

For a period of five (5) years, a one-half cent (0.5%) tax will be collected with a maximum of 75% of that revenue deposited into the Mental Health Treatment Fund to be used for facilities and not less than 25% dedicated to services and treatment; thereafter, 100% of all revenue deposited into the Mental Health Treatment Fund, one-eighth cent (0.125%) tax, shall be used for ongoing operations, services, and treatment.

This operational cost report looks at two types of facilities, the projected cost to operate each type of facility in Mendocino County, and the estimated funding required by Measure B to support the financial viability of each facility.

Mental Health Services

Mental Health Services are provided throughout the County by healthcare providers, agencies, and clinics. Individuals can access services through their insurance company who delineates which providers are part of their network and what services are covered. In general, mental health services include individual and/or group therapy designed to improve the individual's emotional state and functioning. Medi-Cal covered mental health services are defined by California Law and delivered by Counties contracted with the Department of Health Care Services, in the following classification: Mild, Moderate, and Severe symptoms. The County Mental Health Plan is responsible for providing specialty mental health services to adults who have a severe mental illness (SMI) and child/youth with serious emotional disturbance (SED).



Mental Health Facilities

There are a variety of different types of Mental Health Facilities; however this report will focus on two types: Crisis Residential Treatment Facility and Acute Psychiatric Hospitalization Facility.

Crisis Residential Treatment Facility (CRTF): A non-institutional residential facility providing an alternative to hospitalization that is designed to serve individuals who are experiencing acute psychiatric episode or crisis. CRTFs provide short-term, intensive, and supportive services in a home-like environment through an active social rehabilitation program that is certified by the California Department of Health Care Services and licensed by the California Department of Social Services, Community Care Licensing Division. Services are designed to support individuals in restoring and maintaining interpersonal and independent living skills and adaptive functioning.

Crisis Residential Treatment Facilities are a common addition to the continuum of care of mental health services. This type of facility offers the ability to provide alternatives to the higher level of care and placement options from higher level of care. Currently, Behavioral

Health and Recovery Services do not have access to use this type of facility, as there are none within Mendocino County.

Acute Psychiatric Hospitalization: Is a highly structured level of care for individuals who are experiencing emotional and/or behavioral symptoms that put them at risk of harm to themselves, harm to others, or unable to care for their basic needs. An individual is hospitalized to provide assessment, safety monitoring, therapy, and medication management.

There are three types of acute psychiatric facilities: Freestanding Acute Psychiatric Hospital, Psychiatry Health Facility, and Psychiatric Units with General Acute Hospitals. These facilities are the highest level of care for individuals experiencing an acute psychiatric episode.

Mental Health Funding:

Mental Health Services are reimbursed through an individual's insurance company, with services being provided through a provider network. Individuals with insurance such as Veterans Affairs, Medicare, Kaiser Permanente, and Anthem Blue Cross need to work with their insurance company to obtain a list of covered mental health services and providers. As stated prior, individuals who have Medi-Cal and need access to mental health services are offered services based on their symptoms and functional impairment level, i.e. mild, moderate, or severe. The County Mental Health Plan is responsible for providing specialty mental health services to adults who have a severe mental illness (SMI) and child/youth with serious emotional disturbance (SED). Partnership Health Plan of California is responsible for providing mental health services to individuals with mild and moderate symptoms.

Private Insurance, Veterans Affairs, and Medicare reimburse for services based on negotiated rates for the services being provided.

Medi-Cal services are covered by a combination of State and Federal funds. Realignment funds allocated to each county are used for a range of health, mental health and social services programs. Specialty Mental Health Services receives realignment funds from two realignment sources: 1991 and 2011. 1991 Realignment funding is from Vehicle License Fees and a statewide distribution of a 0.5% Sales Tax. 2011 realignment funding is from a 1.0625% Sales Tax. Specialty Mental Health Realignment funds have specific use requirements and are used to draw down Federal Financial Participation (FFP) funds. FFP funding amounts for the reimbursement of covered Medi-Cal services are determined by the Federal Medicaid Assistance Percentage (FMAP) that is set by the Federal Government. The remaining cost of the services is reimbursed by Realignment dollars.

Projected Operating Costs

The projected operating costs for the two types of facilities being considered in this report are based on Mendocino County Behavioral Health and Recovery Services fiscal year 18/19 cost for

psychiatric hospitalization and information obtained from other counties and providers of these types of facilities.

Crisis Residential Treatment Facility: As Mendocino County does not have a Crisis Residential Treatment Facility (CRTF) within the county, the projection for the operational cost is based on information obtained from other counties and treatment providers, in addition to an analysis of current hospitalization rates, cost, and statistical averages.

For the purpose of this projection, it is assumed that an 8-bed CRTF will be constructed. The projected annual operating cost for an 8-bed CRTF would be approximately \$1.1 million dollars. This cost includes the cost of the facility lease. Given that the County will be leasing the CRTF for \$1.00 per month, overall operational costs to the contractor will be lower.

The following estimates are based on a \$1.1 million dollar cost per year and a maximum Medi-Cal reimbursement rate allowable of Three Hundred Forty-Five Dollars and Thirty-Eight Cents (\$345.38) per bed day. These projections do not take into account reimbursement for clients covered by other third party payors, private pay or indigent clients.

Behavioral Health and Recovery Services would recommend a provider with a minimum of 3 years of experience to ensure that the organization has the management and administrative procedures necessary to deliver high quality services to the community and bill for all services in a manner that maximizes reimbursement of organizational costs.

Psychiatric Health Facility / Psychiatric Unit / Psychiatric Hospital: While Mendocino County does not have this type of facility within the county, BHRS Medi-Cal clients are admitted to psychiatric facilities on a regular basis. In fiscal year 2018 -2019, BHRS hospitalized 684 individuals (447 adults and 237 children); of that number, 442 individuals had Medi-Cal.

Based on information obtained for a 16-bed facility the operating costs are between \$5 million to \$7.9 million, with the average cost of \$365,000 per bed per year. The funding sources to cover the operating costs include Medi-Cal, Medicare, Realignment, MHSA, and Private Insurance.

Due to the Medi-Cal payment regulations for psychiatric facilities, projected costs will vary widely based on the type of facility that contracts for the services. Behavioral Health and Recovery Services recommends that the County contract with a 16-bed facility to ensure maximum Medi-Cal reimbursement, and include the \$1.00 per month lease option to minimize the facility costs thereby reducing the funding required by Measure B to maintain financial

stability. BHRS would also suggest that the Committee consider a contractor that will work with other counties such as Lake and would also serve clients with private insurance, and Medicare to maintain occupancy rates, thereby reducing operating costs. If the facility is operated similar to other private facilities, no additional funding from Measure B would be required.

Projected Cost for Behavioral Health Regional Training Center, Crisis Residential Treatment Center, and Acute Psychiatric Hospital

The Mendocino County Behavioral Health Regional Training Center will serve the Superior Region of California as well as counties south of Mendocino. Its purpose is to provide training and workshop space for First Responders, Practitioners, and Agencies that directly and indirectly interact with people experiencing acute and chronic behavioral health conditions. This resource will function as a business, and will require a fee system in order to be sustainable. Ideally, this service will sustain itself financially.

The collective amount is deducted from the Nacht & Lewis fees on page 5.

Dollars per Gross Square Foot, Contingency Prices, and Construction Management are all dependant upon the price of BIDs, and the decided upon contract amount. With the economic recession, we can expect costs in Manufacturing, Construction, and Real Estate to decrease creating a potentially less expensive project than what has been estimated.

Alternatives to New Construction

The following information was gathered from: The California Hospital Association, Aurora Santa Rosa Hospital, and previous estimates obtained by Measure B in conjunction with Mendocino County Behavioral Health

Renovating a building to create a PHF in a rural area (such as Mendocino County) can cost between \$400 to \$650 per square foot in comparison to a new facility at an estimated \$1122 per square foot. Another measuring or estimation device calculates \$500,000 per bed. For instance, the 27,000 square foot former Howard Hospital building may cost up to \$17 million to renovate (or \$630-\$650 per square foot), while a 16-bed facility may cost approximately \$8 million to renovate according to the \$500,000 per bed model. This excludes some soft costs including the cost of equipment and operations.







1 FLOOR PLAN OPTION-2


















SITE PLAN

SUMMARY OF REQUEST / BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

Doug Anderson in Facilities (our internal partner) went through the competitive bid process to secure a Construction Manager for the CRT project to aid the transition from design to construction.

AECOM, a twenty year veteran firm in Construction Management won the bid, and is looking forward to working with Measure B.

A Construction Manager ensures that the project is sound before construction begins, and keeps the client (Measure B) fully apprised of next steps. Most importantly, they manage construction bids, ensuring that contractors and subcontractors are eligible to work with the County in addition to staying on-task.

Not contracting with them will delay and jeopardize the CRT project, slowing down the construction process indefinitely.
